



Water Pollution Control Loan Fund

This is a State EPA-funded program that Marion Public Health is facilitating to eliminate pollution from failing septic systems. In 2020, there were 12 septic systems that were either repaired, replaced, or connected to a public sewer using this funding.

Each household is estimated to generate approximately 120 gallons of wastewater per bedroom per day. Through this grant, Marion Public Health was able to eliminate an estimated 4,230 gallons per day, or 1.58 million gallons per year, of untreated wastewater going into our lakes, streams, and ponds via farm tiles, ditches, and creeks.

STD Treatment & Prevention

One of the highest communicable diseases we see in Marion County is the sexually transmitted disease Chlamydia. The spread of such diseases and infections can be limited or prevented through safe practices, such as using condoms and having regular testing performed.

Marion Public Health's Sexual Health Clinic is open weekly on Tuesdays to help with the treatment and prevention of these diseases, as well as other services such as annual pap smears, breast exams, birth control, and more.

In 2020, this program saw 86 patients for these services.

Narcan Kit Distribution

Marion Public Health, thanks to grant funding, is able to provide Narcan kits to the community free of charge. This life-saving drug comes as a nasal spray and is designed to reverse the effects of opiate overdose.

In 2020, through on-site and off-site outreach efforts, MPH distributed 227 Narcan kits, and had 71 reported known reversals!

Immunizations

One of the services Marion Public Health provides to the community is our weekly immunization clinic. Additionally, our nurses work closely with local community partners to provide immunizations off-site to help keep our children and families healthy.

In 2020, our immunization efforts saw 527 people immunized, with a total of 1,191 vaccines being administered.





- 836 deaths occurred with 2,857 death certificates issued




COMMUNICABLE DISEASE

Non-COVID19 communicable diseases for 2020: 645







2020 Participation






We miss seeing families in person and are looking forward to the day of having them back in our offices.

Why the drop in participation?

The COVID pandemic directly impacted families' participation in the WIC program. The WIC clinic changed how services were administered thanks to the USDA putting a waiver in place so that families did not have to come into the clinic and could continue to receive food benefits. The appointments were completed over the phone and staff would provide curbside service to get cards loaded each day. Services never halted through the pandemic but possibly the need for food has changed. Families are now offered food through some easier avenues such as increases in SNAP benefits, increases in the number of drive-through food banks, and families receiving COVID relief funds.

POPULATION HEALTH

Baby & Me Tobacco Free kept going strong.

The Baby and Me Tobacco Free program has served 10 women of Marion County since July 2020. There are 9 active participants and 4 pending participants as of June 2021. In total 41 appointments have been conducted. One support partner has been enrolled, who quit for his health, his wife's health, and the health of their son who is due Sept 2021. Referrals are received from Marion Co WIC, Goodwill, Help Me Grow, and other community partners totaling 52 women referred to the program since July 2020. Every referral is followed by the program facilitator. Many referrals have unreachable numbers, and have experienced the loss of unborn infant, or do not have interest in participating in the program. Successfully a billboard was created to advertise and engage with the community in an effort to seek self-referrals. Safe outreach was conducted to many area physicians, community agencies, businesses, and counseling centers including participation at a drive thru event.

This year Barbie White, program facilitator has worked with women who have previously quit in the 3 months prior to pregnancy and women who have had to begin the journey of cessation with her help. Another participant is set to enroll their support partner in the program (they enroll at the time of the woman's postpartum period). Despite challenges during the pandemic, the program has had very successful sessions with positive feedback from participants. One participant told Barbie in December that she looks forward to the day of their sessions because she likes to start her day talking with her. She feels motivated and the session puts her in a good place mentally for the day. The Baby and Me Tobacco Free has more work that must be done in the community. The goal is to continuously work to reach all eligible women, address health disparities, and rally for health equity.
